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AOTA-NBCOT® Joint Initiative:Developing the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact

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The American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) and state occupational therapy

This article explains the need for a licensure compact in the occupational therapy profession and describes the joint American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) and National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT®) initiative to develop and implement the compact. Despite uniformity in occupational therapy licensure laws across the states, the ability to obtain and maintain licenses in multiple jurisdictions remains complicated and time consuming. Occupational therapy practitioners will benefit from an improvement to the existing state licensure system that would allow them to obtain a privilege to practice in multiple states through an interstate licensure compact. The licensure compact will be implemented by a commission composed of state regulators from each participating state. In September 2019, AOTA and NBCOT issued a joint statement announcing that the two organizations would be collaborating to support the development of an interstate licensure compact for occupational therapy. This article highlights the need for the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact, the process used to develop the compact's language, and the state legislative progress made to date. It also outlines the next steps needed to advance Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact legislation as well as efforts needed to operationalize the Occupational Therapy Compact Commission.

Compact Development - Timeline

Oct. '19 – Feb. '20 Advisory Group convenes to develop compact recommendations

Feb. – May '20 Drafting team convenes to write compact legislation

May – Aug. '20 Draft compact is submitted back to Advisory Group;

CSG conducts stakeholder review

Sept. – Oct. '20 Drafting Team and Advisory Group incorporate feedback and

finalize compact legislation

What is an interstate compact?

A legal, legislatively enacted contract between two or more states

Compact Policy Objectives

- Ensures OTs and OTAs meet acceptable standards of practice
- Expands the availability of occupational therapy services
- Promotes cooperation among OT Compact member states in the areas of licensure and regulation
- Offers a high degree of consumer protection across state lines

How the OT Compact Works

- OT Compact is open to OTs and OTAs
- OT Compact is a Mutual Recognition Model licensure compact that is similar in form and function to other occupational licensing compacts
- Mutual recognition means that compact member states agree to mutually recognize a valid, unrestricted licenses of other compact member states
- OT Compact allows practitioners to practice in compact member states via a Compact Privilege
- The Compact Privilege provides the same benefits as licensure







State Eligibility to Join

In order to participate in the compact, a member state must:

- ✓ License Occupational Therapists and Occupational Therapy Assistants
- ✓ Have a continuing competence/education requirement as a condition for license renewal.
- ✓ Utilize a recognized national exam as a requirement for licensure
- ✓ Utilize a criminal background check for initial compact privileges
- ✓ Comply with the rules of the compact commission







Accessing an OT Compact Privilege

In order to receive a **Compact Privilege** an OT/OTA must:

- ✓ Hold a license in their home state which is a compact member state
- ✓ Have no encumbrance on any state license currently, and no adverse actions against any license or compact privilege within the previous 2 years
- ✓ Submit information for an FBI Criminal Background Check
- ✓ OTs and OTAs must meet any jurisprudence requirement for the member state where they are seeking a privilege
- ✓ Practitioners must adhere to the laws and regulations of the compact member state in which they are practicing







Fact Sheet: Practitioners and the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact

The Basic

- The Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact (OT Compact) is an interstate compact, which is a
 constitutionally authorized contract between states.
- The OT Compact is the same in form and function as other occupational licensure compacts like the Nurse Licensure Compact, the Physical Therapy Compact, and the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact.
- The OT Compact authorizes in-person practice and telepractice based on a valid, unrestricted home state license in other compact member states for both Occupational Therapists (OTs) and Occupational Therapy Assistants (OTAs).
- . The OT Compact will take effect when 10 states have enacted authorizing legislation.
- The American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) is leading the initiative in collaboration with the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT®). The National Center for Interstate Compacts at the Council of State Governments facilitated the development of the Compact and is providing technical assistance.

The Bottom Line for Practitioners

The OT Compact will allow licensed OTs and OTAs to practice in all states that join the compact. This will remove the hurdle of getting an individual license in each state where they want to practice. The broad goal is to eliminate barriers to OT practice and patient care by ensuring cooperation among state regulatory entities for those states that join the compact.
